Highlights:

- International Center for the History of Games, http://www.icheg.org/
- 34 is the average age of a gamer and 49% of gamers are between 18-49 years old; 67% of US households play video games
- Suggested library game events:
 - Wii Wednesdays
 - Minecraft event
 - o Retro game night using older consoles, i.e. Nintendo
- Notice what your patrons are using, develop a short survey (Lyons did)
- School Library Journal article on Minecraft in the Library
- Expand your collection with books and players guides on gaming, i.e. books on the popular Minecraft
- Wood Library partnered with a local Minecraft group
- Clifton suggests you don't always need a formal program—provide the laptops and kids will make it happen!
- Red Jacket uses multiple monitors. Can get a Minecraft account for the library for \$25, no expiration
- Bandwidth is a consideration; Phelps had to increase their bandwidth to accommodate setting up their own gaming server
- Game Stop sells used games with one year warranty for additional \$1-2 per game
- Consider a hang out area for imaginative play games, i.e. World of War Craft
- Yu-Gi-Oh and Pokemon games are still popular
- RPG = role playing games
- Entertainment Software Ratings Board ESRB can be a helpful. (Amanda did disagree with some ratings)
- Reminder: library staff cannot assume the role of parents
- November is International Games Day @ Your Library, http://igd.ala.org/faq/
- Check compatibility of newer systems with older games
- No new Wii games being developed, but the new Wii U system is backward compatible with some older games
- No new Nintendo DS games being developed, but some older DS games can be played on the newer system
