Sharing

<u>Lynne (VIC)</u>: Victor recently celebrated the library's 75th anniversary. Tried to collect 75 stories (will keep working on that), and had 75 cakes (1 cake & cupcakes), and 75 prizes. Newspaper sent a reporter and the Town Supervisor attended.

Victor started a self-checkout option (a Bob Wicksall facilitated software enhancement) for patrons, which is located near their self-service hold shelf.

<u>Jenny (CAN)</u>: The library will be going for a vote May 20th for a \$10,000 increase to their current \$600,000 budget – a 1.67% increase. (a \$150,000 assessed property = 75 cents increase over last year) Vote will be held in conjunction with the school budget vote. One message the library needs to get out is that the library addition was funded with private donations and some state construction grants. The library plans 2 community presentations, a mailing to supporters, and has already met with the local paper's editorial board. At a recent school budget presentation, they mentioned that the school vote and the library vote are 2 separate items.

<u>Peggy (PER):</u> Recently, Ontario Public Library sponsored a concert of the Yellow Jackets, as part of their 100th anniversary celebration, and Peggy attended—an excellent program.

<u>Jenny (CAN):</u> The Yellow Jackets will be coming back to participate in Wood Library's Extravaganza event in September.

Program 1: Human Library - Don't Judge a Book By Its Cover

Presenter: Judy Schewe, Music & Media Librarian, Central Library of Rochester

Highlights:

- Judy worked on the joint RPL & U of R Human Library project (see handout of programs)
- Humanlibrary.org, originally started in Copenhagen, Denmark as a youth movement to stop violence
- Human Library helps connect individuals with their community and promote tolerance, celebrate differences, and encourage understanding
- Choose challenging books, look beyond your comfort zone
- This is not a storytelling session, choose human books to challenge prejudice and/or discrimination
- Human Books volunteer and respectfully converse with "borrowers". The books are kept anonymous, and are asked to create their own title.
- Have an application form and conduct Human Book interviews with more than one interviewer (you can reject a person)
- Keep human book loans to a set time, such as 30 minutes

- Anna Grace (WADS) Outcomes Made Easy (Outcome Measures Michele Gorman PLA program)
 - Libraries have to be more than liked by their communities, libraries have to articulate their impact on communities
 - Use 7 simple steps to evaluate a library program and do the first 5 steps *before* the programs is scheduled
 - Keep program evaluation simple. Example: Resume workshop, ask participants on a scale of 1-10, are you more prepared for a job search

- Use props and movement such as dancing
- Post storytime expectations

- Every Child Ready to Read, revised in 2011, gives 5 practical tips for each element (Talking, Singing, Reading, Writing, Playing)
