

Our Community Reads



Our Community Reads strongly believes that the sooner we can engage family reading, the more likely children will be to recognize the value of literacy in their lives. As a result, our community becomes stronger and more vibrant. Together we create a culture and love for literacy and books.

Volunteer Readers in Schools

Our Community Reads coordinates volunteers to read in classrooms. Teachers can sign up for this service and a reader will arrive each week to share great children's literature with the class. These volunteer readers are often celebrity readers at the Family Fun Literacy Nights or Our Community Reads Community Events. The students are excited to see their story time friend outside of the classroom and are great recruiters for attendance at these events. To help students invite parents to the evening and weekend events, students are given bookmarks to take home with pertinent information. Book give-aways are also part of the volunteer reader program.

Family Fun Literacy Night

Family Fun Literacy Night is a community event sponsored in collaboration with Newark Our Community Reads, Literacy Volunteers of Wayne County, Wayne County Public Libraries, and our schools. This event encourages families to come out and join in an evening filled with stories read by local celebrity readers, students and other community volunteers.

The gathering lasts for an hour and provides a great model of reading to children for parents, grandparents and caregivers. Entire families are encouraged to come and enjoy the evenings. Usually events last an hour to an hour and a half with a children's book give-away during and after the event. Families are welcome to come and go at their leisure; the events are open and relaxed. Books are provided by Literacy Volunteers and focus on birth to 8 years old.

Community Events

Banks, Restaurants, Farms, Parks and Fairs, these events happen everywhere. Sometimes a business sponsor or a community sponsor hosts a unique event and other times a table or reading area is set up at an existing location. Usually these events are monthly, but they can take place more frequently.

These events are open and usually extend for a few hours so that families can stroll in and out at their convenience. Unique thematic activities that pair well with the selected stories for the event make the day all about farm animals, pirates, campfires, teddy bears and more! These events build background knowledge and give families hands-on practice at supporting learning at home.

And More!

At these events, Literacy Volunteers, school, and library staff and other celebrity readers build relationships with families. Genuine conversation about family needs often arise. Whether it is a referral for adult literacy services, career assistance or a parenting class—these events provide a point of contact for families and help connect services with clients in need. Recommending Incredible Years parenting classes is a specific aim of the OCR program. All parents find benefit in this evidenced based course designed to help parents understand positive discipline, the importance of child directed play and other parenting topics through the use of video vignettes and group discussion.



Ways Parents Can Promote Reading at Home

Create a quiet, comfortable place to read.

Keep reading time enjoyable and relaxed.

Read aloud to your child daily.

Be enthusiastic when reading.

Read your child's book over and over.

Stop and ask about the pictures and about what is happening.

Read from a variety of children's books, including fairy tales, poems and information books.

Let your child see you reading magazines, newspapers, and books.

Listen to your child read daily.

Schedule regular trips to the library.



Help Your Child Become a Better Reader



Questions to ask your child While reading fiction text

Who is the main character? What was the setting?

What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?

What do you predict will happen next in the story?

Why do you think the author chose the title for the story?

Do you like the title of the story: Why or Why not?

Can you think of a different title for the story?

Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?

What part of the story was the most exciting? Why?

Did you like the end of the story? Why or Why not?

Questions to ask your child While reading nonfiction text

What is the main idea of the text?
What did you learn from reading the text?

Are there any words that you do not know what they mean?

What are some new words that you learned?

Do you have any questions after reading this?

Were there any important features (Charts, diagrams, pictures) that were important?

Where could you find more information about this topic?

Did you like this text? Why or why not?



Concepts of Print


In order to learn to read, a child must learn how books work.

Concepts of print include knowing:

- · where the front of the book is
- Where the back of the book is
 - How a book opens
- · Right side up from upside down
- The top of the page from the bottom of the page

Children only learn them if they have been read to a great deal and have had many opportunities to handle books.

Reading to a child in your lap will help them learn these basic concepts. Your child will gain a sense of how books work by helping turn the pages as you read.

School Reader Instructions Our Community Reads



Scheduling:

- ✓ Reader and Teacher contact information will be exchanged.
- ✓ A first reading date/time will be assigned.
- ✓ Community readers will read to a classroom weekly at a designated time and day.
- Changes to scheduled reading times (including absences) are to be discussed by readers and teachers together.
- ✓ The length of school visits should be determined by the reader and the teacher.

Choosing Books:

- ✓ Any age-appropriate book can be read by the guest reader.
- ✓ Teachers and readers will discuss book options, and teachers may choose to give readers complete freedom in book choice.
- ✓ The Newark Children's Librarian, Krystina Hardter, will be happy to assist in book choice as needed.
- ✓ Books can be from the reader or teacher's personal collection, or from the library.
- ✓ Books from the Newark Public Library must be checked out to the teacher or reader's library card.

Additional Resources

READY FOR KINDERGARTEN!

What does it mean to be ready for school? Every child develops in a unique way. We are confident that a child who can arrive at school being able to do these things will have a foundation for success.

Pre-reading skills and number knowledge are especially important!

- O Recognizing and writing first name
- Knows first and last name of parents
- O Listens to and follows directions
- Recognizing both capital and lowercase letters in the alphabet
- O Matches a letter with the beginning sound of a word (matches the letter 'B' with a picture of a banana)
- O Tells how old he or she is
- Adjusts to new situations without parent being there
- O Draws a line, circle, X and +

- O Recognizes and names at least five colors
- O Takes care of own needs, such as toileting, washing hands and dressing
- O Recognizes and names 4 shapes; circle, square, rectangle and triangle
- O Counts from 1 to 20 in correct order; can count out 10 objects
- O Adds and subtracts familiar objects, such as blocks (when given two and given one more can say that there are three)
- O Puts written numbers in order from 1 to 5

- O Sees a written number (3) and knows this means three objects, such as three bears
- O Is able to pay attention to a task until completion— coloring a picture, putting together a small puzzle or listening to a book for example
- O Can explain a story through pictures he/she has drawn
- O Runs, hops, throws, catches, and bounces a ball
- Uses pencils, crayons, and markers for drawing and writing, and cuts with scissors

GETTING READY FOR KINDERGARTEN WITH PIZZA!!

MATH SKILLS:

- SHAPES: What shape is the Pizza Box? What shape is the Pizza? What shape does a slice of pizza look like?
- COUNTING: How many pieces of pepperoni are there? How many slices of pizza are there in a whole pizza? How many slices in half of a pizza?
- ADDITION & SUBTRACTION: Count the total number of pieces. Subtract as each person takes a piece.
 Add up the total number of pieces that each person ate.

LITERACY SKILLS:

- What are five words that describe this pizza?
- Help your child identify the word "Pizza"—work on the beginning "P" sound. Name other objects that have that beginning sound.
- Help your child look for letters in his or her name on the menu or on the box.
- Name words that rhyme with "Cheese" or "Box" or "Wings"
- Discuss how this pizza was made. Start with a farmer planting grain or milking cows and continue on until
 the pizza is in the oven. Help your child use words like FIRST, NEXT, and FINALLY. Being able to
 understand steps in a process is important.
- Ask your child to imagine a funny story about their favorite animal ordering or eating a pizza and help them draw pictures to share their story. This is a fun activity to do along with your child. You or your child can start by saying, "FIRST a Giraffe called Mark's from the zoo to order a Pizza. . .

Parents & guardians are the most important teachers for every child. Learning opportunities are everywhere!! Enjoy opportunities to help your child develop their understanding of the world!!
