Transforming lives of people with disabilities

- Independent, non-profit agency operating school and six group homes.
- School located in 5 buildings on 3 campuses.
- Group homes located throughout Monroe County









By The Numbers

- Nearly 450 school students
- Just under 50 school districts
- Students come from over 10 counties surrounding Rochester
- 44 people call Mary Cariola residences home
- Approximately 700 staff members





Preschool



- Designed for 3-5 year old children
- Half-day and full-day depending on evaluations
- Student's abilities and developmental delays vary and could include autism, medical needs, behavioral challenges and other learning needs.
- Community based diagnostic evaluation services are offered.
- Students referred through County Health Department.
- 50% graduation rate back to district.



School Age



- Each classroom operates as an interdisciplinary team combining special education with a variety of clinical and therapeutic services appropriate for individual students.
- Each student assigned a social worker to act as liaison.
- School age serves students 5-21.
- Students are accepted into school if their home school district conducts evaluations and determined placement



Specialty Services







Community Services

- Operate 6 residential homes across Monroe
 County where residents receive 24-care from
 expert direct care and clinical staff
- All residents attend school or, if over age 21, adult day program
- Staff focus on life skill development and assisting residents in experiencing all that life has to offer
